
A.A.S. ELECTION - 2004

American Arachnological Society Minutes of the 27th Annual Meeting Denver Museum of Nature and Science 27 July 2003

-President Brent Opell called the meeting to order at 4:37 p.m. mst.

Old Business and Announcements

- The minutes of the 26th AAS Business meeting, held at the University of California, Riverside on 28 June 2002, were considered and approved unanimously by voice vote.
- President Opell reviewed business the Executive Committee had conducted via e- mail since the last Business meeting:

To restrict access to the on-line Journal of Arachnology to Society Members

To restrict AAS Research Awards to members of the AAS

To use PayPal for dues and annual meeting payments

To distribute the Society's Newsletter, American Arachnology, via electronic mail to Members with e-mail access

- Opell recognized Paula Cushing, the meeting host. Cushing acknowledged the recognition, and emphasized the enormous work done by her assistants (all 43), the audio-visual personnel, the Executive Committee, those on the Spider Genera of North America Revision team, and the meeting sponsors. The assembled Membership concurred with a rousing round of applause.
- George Uetz then read a letter to the Membership from Sherry Hieber, the wife of the late Dr. Craig Hieber, thanking the AAS
 for their collective thoughts and support during a difficult time.
- Karen Cangialosi presented the treasurer's report by distributing the 2nd quarter Treasurer's Report. She explained the report and indicated that the Society's finances has been improving. Cangialosi stated that PayPal has been working well, and encouraged everyone to use it when possible. The report was approved by a unanimous voice vote of the membership. President Opell and the Membership thanked Treasurer Cangialosi for her service.
- President Opell read a membership report from Membership Secretary Jeff Schultz, who was then in the Student Paper Competition judges' meeting. The report showed an increase of 3% from 2002 (512 individual members in 2003) and a decline of 12 institutional members (9.4%) since 2002. The latter may have been due to the Society's participation in BioOne.
- Electronic mail addresses have been received for almost 90% of the Membership, which has significantly increased communication efficiency and decreased mailing costs. Through the efforts of webmaster Ken Prestwich, receipt of dues and donations via the AAS website using PayPal (over 25% of all 2003 members and 50% of students) has greatly facilitated transfers of monies
- President Opell encouraged everyone to become a Life Member if possible. This could help with short-term cash-flow in that such members essentially pay in advance for many years of membership.
- Journal of Arachnology Editor-In-Chief Dan Mott reported to the membership that the number of featured articles published in 2002 increased by 58% compared to 2001 (37 in 2001; 64 in 2002), and that time from submission to publication as remained fairly stable (~ 17.5 months). Average cost per page also has remained stable (~\$71) while the number of pages published increased (440 in 2001; 621 in 2002).
- It was reiterated that the JOA is accessible to members via the website, and open to others via BioOne. Furthermore, the search engine and abstracts also are openly available.
- President Opell reported in the absence of President-Elect Gary Miller on future meeting sites. The 2005 meeting will be hosted by Sam Marshall and Maggie Hodge at Hiram College in Hiram, Ohio. We are still searching for the 2006 and other future meeting sites. Those wishing to perform major service to the Society and host a meeting are strongly encouraged to speak with Gary Miller.
- Paula Cushing reported on the status of the revision of the Spiders of North America. It is on-track and has a good layout. Completion is anticipated in 2004, and will be marketed to a broad audience. She made a plea for help with some families.
- Secretary Alan Cady announced results of the 2003 election. With a good ballot return (89), Dr. Beth Jakob was elected President-Elect, Dr. James Carrel was elected Director, and Karen Cangialosi was re-elected Treasurer. Cady thanked the nomination committee of Rich Bradley, Bruce Cutler, and Rosie Gillespie for their service.
- Beth Jakob announced the winners of the Student Paper & Poster Awards from 19 podium and 7 poster presentations. Ingi Agnarsson won the paper presentation award, and Ryan Bell won the poster presentation. Jakob stated the judging was difficult, and gave thanks to the dedicated judges. The Membership showed their appreciation with a strong round of applause.
- There was no Old Business to attend to.

New Business

- President Opell announced to the membership that the Executive Committee is planning extensive Constitutional and By-Laws changes to reflect advancements in communication and changes in the Society. These should be presented to the Membership as the Executive Committee addresses these issues and suggests action.
- President Opell provided some examples such as making the webmaster a non-elected, voting member of the Executive Committee, (Opell went on to give heartfelt accolades to our webmaster Ken Prestwich), have the Editor-In-Chief of the Journal be a voting member of the Executive Committee, and the Parliamentarian be an appointed non-voting member of the Executive Committee.
- It was suggested from the floor that there be a student member on the Executive Committee, which is something the Executive Committee will consider.
- Rich Bradley rose from the floor to commend the service President Opell has given to the Society during his term in office. The Membership present seconded Dr. Bradley's comments with thunderous applause.
- In turn, President Opell recognized all of the assistance given to him by the other Society officers.
- A motion to adjourn was made and seconded at 5:35 p.m.


Also, the forms were available in Number 69 of *American Arachnology*, along with more detailed information about the 2004 Meeting.
