Proposed Constitution

ARTICLE I Name

Section 1: The name of the organization shall be: American Arachnological Society.

Section 2: Similar groups or organizations which are willing to abide by and uphold the Constitution and Bylaws of the Society, may be incorporated as branches of the organization.

ARTICLE II Purpose and Objectives

Section 1: To promote the study of non-acarine arachnids.

Section 2: To achieve closer cooperation and understanding between amateur and professional arachnologists.

Section 3: To publish the Journal of the American Arachnological Society.

ARTICLE III Membership

All persons interested in the objectives of the Society shall be eligible for membership.

ARTICLE IV Meetings

There shall be an annual meeting open to all members.

ARTICLE V Officers

Section 1: The elective offices shall consist of President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and a three member Board of Directors.

Section 2: The officers shall be elected by a majority of votes cast.

ARTICLE VI Amending the Constitution

Section 1: The Constitution or any part thereof may be amended, suspended or repealed by a two-thirds majority of those voting in a mail ballot, provided there is a two months notice of the proposed change.

Section 2: Any member in good standing may propose, in writing, an amendment to the constitution to the Executive Committee. Such a proposal, if approved by a majority of the Executive Committee, shall be submitted with a recommendation to the members. A proposed change to the Constitution not recommended by the Executive Committee must be submitted to the members of the Society if five or more members re-submit it.

AMERICAN ARACHNOLOGICAL SOCIETY

Proposed Bylaws

ARTICLE I Membership

Section 1: Membership shall be open to all persons who make formal application and pay the prescribed dues, and who are willing to abide by and uphold the Constitution and Bylaws of the Society.

Section 2: Institutions may not become members, but may subscribe to publications.

Section 3: Membership dues shall be established by recommendation of the Executive Committee at the annual meeting and shall be ratified by a majority vote of the members attending the meeting. Dues shall be paid upon receipt of an annual bill.

Section 4: All members in good standing have the right to vote.

Section 5: Any member in good standing is eligible to hold office.

Section 6: A member whose dues have not been paid within a reasonable period of time will forfeit the privileges of membership. Such members may be reinstated upon payment of delinquent dues.

Section 7: The services and privileges of membership shall include the following:

- 1. Subscription to all publications
- 2. Vote in accordance with the Bylaws
- 3. Participation in all activities and functions of the Society

Section 8: A class of Honorary Membership shall be established. An individual may be elected at the annual business meeting by the proposal of the Executive Committee. The number of Honorary members is not to exceed 5% of the total membership.

ARTICLE II Officers

Section 1: The elective offices shall consist of: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and a three member Board of Directors.

Section 2: The officers and Board of Directors of the Society shall serve as the Executive Committee. Fifty percent of the Executive Committee represents a quorum.

ARTICLE II (cont.) Proposed Bylaws (CONTINUED)

Section 3: The officers and Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority of votes cast in a mail ballot.

Section 4: Officers and Board of Directors shall serve for two years, or until their successors are elected.

Section 5: An officer or Board of Director member may be renominated but may not serve for more than two consecutive terms in the same office.

Section 6: The President shall preside at meetings of the Society and Executive Committee. He shall appoint all committee chairpersons as the need arises. The Executive Committee shall appoint all committees.

Section 7: The Vice-President shall assume the duties of the President in his absence at meetings, and shall become President in the event of death, resignation or disability of the President. In the event of absence of both President and Vice-President at a meeting, a temporary Chairman may be chosen to preside at that meeting by the members of the Executive Committee attending the meeting.

Section 8: The Secretary, or his delegate, shall keep minutes of the proceedings of all Society meetings, conduct official correspondence and keep membership records.

Section 9: The Treasurer shall keep the financial records, accept dues and monies, issue bills, pay bills, maintain the bank account and report annually to the members. The account shall be subject to annual audit by a committee appointed by the Executive Committee.

Section 10: Publication policy shall be a responsibility of the Executive Committee, which may appoint an editor or editors to implement this policy.

Section 11: Election of officers and Board of Director members shall be held every two years by a mail-in ballot. The ballots shall be counted by three members appointed by the President. The nominees for each office shall be selected either by a nominating committee or may be nominated by any member in good standing. Write-ins on ballots will be

Section 12: Procedural matters shall be passed by a default system. If less than 10% of the membership send negative remarks to the Secretary within a month of mailing, a motion will pass. If 10% or more reply with negative comments, a general mail vote will be taken, with a majority of votes cast determining the issue.

ARTICLE III Meetings

Section 1: There shall be an annual general meeting of the Society open to all members. The date, time and place to be designated by the Executive Committee.

Section 2: The membership shall be informed of the date, time and place of the annual general meeting at least three months prior to the meeting.

Section 3: Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the President.

Section 4: An annual business meeting open to all members will be held in conjunction with the general meeting at a time to be designated by the President.

Section 5: Additional meetings may be called by the Executive Committee or by the request of twenty or more members.

ARTICLE IV Dues

Section 1: A Charter Membership will be available for the sum of \$20.00, for the period of one year from the time of adoption of the Constitution and Bylaws by the general membership.

Section 2: Annual dues will be \$10.00 per calendar year.

Section 3: Institutional membership will be \$7.00 per calendar year.

Section 4: Student membership will be \$5.00 per calendar year.

Section 5: Honorary membership will be gratis and must be bestowed by the vote of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV (cont.)

Section 6: Associate membership for low income workers or for countries where it is not possible to send money will be gratis and must be bestowed by the Executive Committee.

Section 7: Records relating to the Society funds shall be published annually, and shall be open for inspection to any member at any time.

ARTICLE V Amending the Bylaws

Bylaws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed by a two-thirds majority of those voting in a mail ballot, provided there is a two months notice of the proposed change.

ARTICLE VI Parliamentary Authority

If not contrary to the Constitution or Bylaws, procedures to be followed in meetings of the Society shall be those established in "Roberts Rules of Order Revised", Seventy-fifth or later editions.

CONSTITUTION

Revised April 1973

ARTICLE I Name

Section 1: The name of the organization shall be: The American Arachnological Society Corporation.

Section 2: Similar groups or organizations which are willing to abide by and uphold the Constitution and Bylaws of the Society may be incorporated as branches of the organization.

ARTICLE II Purposes and Objectives

Section 1: To promote the study of arachnida.

Section 2: To achieve closer cooperation and understanding between amateur and professional arachnologists.

Section 3: To publish the Journal of the American Arachnological Society.

Section 4: The general purposes and powers are to have and exercise all rights and powers conferred on nonprofit corporations under the laws of California, including the power to contract, rent, buy or sell personal or real property, provided, however, that this corporation shall not, except to an insubstantial degree, engage in any activities or exercise any powers that are not in furtherance of the primary purposes of this corporation.

Section 5: No substantial part of the activities of this corporation shall consist of carrying on propoganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate or intervene in any political campaign (including the publishing or distribution of statements) on behalf of any candidate for public office.

ARTICLE III Membership

All persons interested in the objectives of the Society shall be eligible for membership.

ARTICLE IV Meetings

There shall be an annual meeting open to all members.

ARTICLE V Officers

Section 1: The elective offices shall consist of President-Lee President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Treasurer

Section 2: The officers shall be elected by a majority of votes cast. In case of no majority (a tie), the Equative (ommittee will choose between (among) The tied nomineux.

ARTICLE VI Amending the Constitution

Section 1: The constitution or any part thereof may be amended, suspended or repealed by a two-thirds majority of those voting in a mail ballot, provided there is a two months notice of the proposed change.

Section 2: Any member in good standing may propose, in writing, an amendment to the constitution to the Executive Committee. Such a proposal, if approved by a majority of the Executive Committee, shall be submitted with a recommendation to the members. A proposed change to the Constitution not recommended by the Executive Committee must be submitted to the members of the Society if five or more members re-submit it.

ARTICLE VII Non-profit purposes

This corporation is organized pursuant to the General Non-Profit Corporation Law of the State of California and does not contemplate pecuniary gain or profit to the members thereof and it is organized for non-profit purposes.

ARTICLE VIII Principal office

The county in the State of California where the principal office for the transaction of activities of this corporation is Los Angeles County.

ARTICLE IX Dissolution

The property of this corporation is irrevocably dedicated to arachnological purposes and no part of the net income or assets of this organization shall ever inure to the benefit of any director, officer or member thereof or to the benefit of any private individual. Upon the dissolution or winding up of the corporation—its assets remaining after payment of, or provision for payment of, all debts and liabilities of this corporation, shall be distributed to a non-profit fund, foundation or corporation which is organized

and operated exclusively for arachnological purposes and which has established its tax exempt status under. Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. non-profit fund, foundation or corporation which is organized and operated exclusively for arachnological purposes shall be named at the time of dissolution by the Executive Committee or vote of membership. corporation holds any assets in trust, or corporation is formed for charitable purposes, such assets shall be disposed of in such manner as may be directed by decree of the superior court of the county in which the corporation has its principal office, upon petition therefore by the Attorney General or by a person concerned in the liquidation, in a preceeding to which the Attorney General is a party. The purposes contained in this paragraph are limited to those meeting the requirements for welfare exemption under Section 214 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.



INFO SHEET --- AAS Meeting, Central Missouri State Univ., June 24-26, 1975

MEETINGS AND PRESENTATIONS: All meeting sessions will convene in the main lounge of East Hudson Conference Center, the same building in which housing accommodations are to be had.

In order not to prolong the formal sessions unduly, papers, including discussion of them, should be limited to the time schedule of the program. Chairmen of the session will moderate the questions and comments following each paper and terminate over-extended presentations and discussions to adhere to the schedule.

Slides or films that are to accompany a paper should be given to the projectionist 15 to 30 minutes prior to the session in which they are to be used. Please pick them up from him at the end of the session.

SOCIETY SUPPER AND FIELD TRIP: Wednesday afternoon and evening are informal respite periods. School buses (regrettably) will leave the front door of the Conference Center at 1330 to take all who wish on a 70 mile, four hour trip to Fort Osage, a reconstructed frontier outpost overlooking the Missouri River. Collecting may be done in the surrounding area that includes both open meadow and forest habitats, and there is a museum on the grounds devoted to local pioneer and Indian history. About two hours will be spent at the fort. Please indicate your intention to use the bus at the registration desk, and you are asked to contribute \$1.00 for the transportation of any non-registered "adjunct" who wishes to make the trip.


The supper will be informally served about 2030 around the swimming pool of "The Abode" at 119 West Culton, downtown Warrensburg, about 10 blocks from the Conference Center. You may enter the pool area through a wooden gate around the corner from the Abode's Culton Street entrance. You may swim if you wish and change on the premises. A separate bar with moderately priced beer and other drinks will be open in the pool area. The cost of the supper, exclusive of drinks, is \$3.00 which should be paid at the registration desk before 1800 Tuesday.

MEALS IN GENERAL: Meals may be had in Ellis Hall, across the street from Hudson Conference Center, for \$1.00, \$1.25, and \$1.75 for breakfast, lunch and supper respectively. Meal tickets for any combination of meals may be purchased at the registration desk or each meal may be paid for as you enter. A separate dining room has been arranged for persons who are attending the meetings. Regular breakfast is served from 0645 to 0800 and a continental breakfast from 0800 to 0900. Lunch is from 1100 to 1315 and supper from 1700 to 1815.

The University Union has a cafeteria on the ground floor whose schedule of operation is the same as above, and there is a snack bar open from 0700 to 2200. There are various restaurants and quick snack establishments in the town but none that would qualify in the "petite gourmet" category. Alcoholic drinks other than beer are available only at the Abode and the Holiday Inn. There are several beer parlors in the downtown area. Alcohol is prohibited on state property.
